When this pamphlet was first published, in May 1996, the citation for note 24 was given as *Nazis, Communists, Klansmen, and Others on the Fringe: POLITICAL EXTREMISM IN AMERICA*, by John George and Laird Wilcox, published by Prometheus, Buffalo, New York, (1992), page 444.

On October 17, 2022, a scan of the page was added. However, on treble checking it, I realised the citation was wrong, the relevant quotes appear on page 445. I have therefore added page 445 but have not removed page 444 because it also contains some interesting quotes.

Obviously I am unable to edit the original hard copy.

Rabinovich, Rabbi Emanuel

There will be no more religions. Not only would the existence of a priest class remain a constant danger to our rule, but belief in an afterlife would give spiritual strength to irreconcilable elements in many countries and enable them to resist us. C

This item provides not only an example of a fake quote, but also of a fake rabbi. From all evidence both are creations of longtime anti-Semite Eustace Mullins. An informant well acquainted with Mullins told us that the man "has a sense of humor" and has concocted a number of hoaxes including the Israel Cohen "Racial Program for the 20th Century" (see Cohen). Mullins was at one time strongly influenced by the famous fascist poet Ezra Pound.

The above Rabinovich quote and the one following were utilized by anti-Semitic organs throughout the fifties and sixties and still occasionally rear their ugly heads. "A Rabbi Speaks: Foretells Gentile Doom," Common Sense VI, 167 (August 1, 1952), 1; Frank P. Mintz, The Liberty Lobby and the American Right (Westport, Conn.: Greenhaven, 1985), 59; personal communication, John George with an informant who has known Eustace Mullins since the early fifties.

We will openly reveal our identity with the races of Asia and Africa. I can state with assurance that the last generation of white children is now being born. Our Control Commissions will . . . forbid whites to mate with whites. . . . Thus the white race will disappear, for mixing the dark with the white means the end of the white man, and our most dangerous enemy will become only a memory. C

Reuther, Walter

Carry on the fight for a Soviet America. C

Allegedly from a letter written by the labor leader and his brother, Victor, while visiting the Soviet Union in 1934, this smear was evidently the creation of one Mel Bishop. The Reuthers could accurately be described as anti-Communists. Boller and George, 111.

Roosevelt, Franklin

There is nothing wrong with the Communists in this country; several of the best friends I have got are Communists. P

Representative Martin Dies (D-Texas), who chaired the Special Committee on Un-American Activities in the thirties and forties, claimed that Roosevelt said this to him in 1938. If so, why didn't he put it in his 1940 book, *Trojan Horse in America*, or tell someone of it before 1950? Boller and George, 113.

Rules for Revolution (1919) C

On a dark night in May, 1919, two lorries rumbled across a bridge and on into the town of Dusseldorf. Among the dozen rowdy, singing "Tommies" apparently headed for a gay evening were two representatives of the Allied military integigence. These men had traced a wave of indiscipline, mutiny, and murder among the troops to the local headquarters of a revolutionary organization established in the town.

Pretending to be drunk, they brushed by the sentries and arrested the ringleaders—a group of thirteen men and women seated at a long table.

In the course of the raid the Allied officers emptied the contents of the safe. One of the documents found in it contained a specific outline of "Rules for Bringing About a Revolution." It is reprinted here to show the strategy of materialistic revolution, and how personal attitudes and habits of living affect the affairs of nations:

- "A. Corrupt the young. Get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial, destroy their ruggedness.
- "B. Get control of all means of publicity and thereby:
 - 1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays, and other trivialities.
 - 2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.
 - 3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding these latter up to ridicule, obloquy, and contempt.
 - 4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.
 - 5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.
 - 6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.
 - 7. By specious arguments cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues: honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.
- "C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to help confiscating them and leaving the population helpless."
