I believe that there has been a change in Customs attitude to imports and that they are no longer able to seize something on the grounds that it is judged to be indecent (Guardian, 5:8:86). I suspect that that means that a book is now unlikely to be seized - one has only to see what is on the shelves of W. H. Smith to realise that censorship of reading matter - so long as it is sexual - is almost a dead letter now; but I wonder about illustrated magazines showing bondage et al. Do you agree with this interpretation?

Can you tell me what happens if I object to seizure in this case? Am I likely to be called on to attend court and face prosecution?

I was about to order some more paperbacks from H.O.M. - they have already sent me half a dozen. Would it be wise to cancel, or to postpone, that idea?
