one of Her Majesty's Officers of Customs and Excise on behalf of

Her Majesty by order of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise that:

1. On the 14th day of November 1990 at London (Heathrow) Airport David Alec Webb of Flat E, 15 Sloane Court West, Chelsea, London SW3 4TD imported six obscene video cassette tapes from Holland into the United Kingdom.
2. The said goods are prohibited goods, having been imported into the United Kingdom contrary to Section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act 1876.
3. On the 14 November 1990 the said goods were seized as liable to forfeiture by force of Section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act 1876 and Sections 49(1)(b) and 141(1)(b) of the Customs and Excise Management Act 1979, in the presence of the said David Alec Webb, the owner of the six video cassette tapes.
4. On or about the 20 November 1990 the said David Alec Webb gave provisional notice in writing, subject to viewing, of a claim that the said goods were not liable for seizure, which notice was confirmed on 19 December 1990.
5. The said Commissioners have ordered proceedings for condemnation of the said goods pursuant to Section 139 of and the 3rd Schedule to the said of 1979.
